The upcoming election will be an important one for the Borough of Bound Brook and for the BoundBrook Chronicle. I appeal to all

To remind readers, in the first edition of the Chronicle (February 2015), I noted that there were three campaign promises that I made. My promises have been kept:

readers of the Chronicle to get out and vote.

- 1. **COMMUNICATION:** To provide better communication between government and the people of Bound Brook.
- a. The Bound Brook Chronicle has been published monthly since February and will continue to be published while I am the Mayor.
- b. Mayor Town Hall Meetings have been conducted the first Monday of each month since August 2015. They will continue as long as I am the Mayor.
- c. I established a Mayor's Open Door Policy and have met with concerned businesses and residents in my office on a daily basis. There is a private entrance to the Mayor's office on the South side of Borough Hall. Just ring the doorbell and I will meet with you. The Open Door Policy will continue as long as I am Mayor.
- d. My direct dial phone number at Borough Hall is 732-893-8513 and my personal cellphone number is 732-735-1382.
 Residents and businesses call me at all times of day or night and I have responded to your suggestions and concerns. This policy will continue as long as I am Mayor.
- 2. **REDEVELOPMENT:** Future Redevelopment Projects and agreements in Bound Brook must provide a clearly defined benefit to existing residents of BBNJ. With the help of our Council and legal professionals, negotiations with Redevelopers must result in Property Tax reduction for existing residents, increased property values and provide for significant offsite improvements in the Borough.

The existing Borough Council, including my Mayoral opponent, is responsible for negotiating a Redevelopment Agreement that provides an annual \$800,000 tax break to the developer of the Meridia Apartments. In addition, the Borough Council recently voted to extend the tax break for a total of 30 years. The taxpayers of Bound Brook will suffer from this "deal" for the next 30 years.

While I am Mayor, I will fight to prevent these kinds of deals from being negotiated. Redevelopment Agreements that punish Bound Brook property taxpayers and unfairly reward developers are not appropriate.

3. **BELIEVE IN BOUND BROOK:** One of the most important obligations of the Mayor is to advocate the positive attributes of Bound Brook.

Founded in 1681, Bound Brook is a historic location with roots in the Revolutionary War. It is a place of history, traditions and



patriotism. With that storied past, we can now include the following positive attributes.

- Reliable Public Safety: Professional and Responsive Police, Fire Department, Rescue Squad and Office of Emergency Management. Police patrol the neighborhoods of Bound Brook 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. If you have an emergency and dial 911, a police car will be at your location within minutes, followed by the Rescue Squad and Fire Department if necessary. An ambulance will be dispatched by a local hospital if requested.
- b. **Outstanding Public Works Department:**Reliable Rubbish Removal, leaf and yard debris pickup, Recycling, Snow Removal, Street Cleaning operations, pot hole repair, graffiti removal and much more.
- c. Exceptional School District: Curriculum and teachers in a technologically rich environment with Bound Brook High School recognized as a "NJ School of Choice." Over \$3 million in financial aid awarded to senior class of 2014. Internationally competitive Robotics program and NJ state competitive sports teams. Students in the Bound Brook School System are issued notebook computers in Grades 6-8 and IPads in High School.
- d. Traditional Neighborhoods and Parks: A friendly town with sidewalks, a main street, churches, a synagogue, a historic Vaudeville theater, professional offices, local stores, banks, restaurants, a world-class grocery store, sporting goods store and flower shop. Billian-Legion Park and its impressive American Flag welcome visitors to Bound Brook and Codrington Park serves the residents with outstanding recreation facilities.
- e. Available New Jersey Transit Rail and Bus Service: Provides convenient access to New York City, Philadelphia, Newark International Airport and Atlantic City. With the one-seat round-trip ride from Bound Brook to NYC now available to commuters in the morning at 9-10-11-12 & 1 and returning directly to Bound Brook from NY Penn Station in the evenings at 8-9-10-11 &12.
- f. **All Roads lead to Bound Brook:** Bound Brook is a primary exit from U.S. Routes 287 & 206 and County Routes 22 & 28 and has easy access to and from U.S. Route 78.
- g. World-Class Entertainment & Sports: Somerset Patriots Minor League Baseball,

The Brook Theatre, The State Theater in New Brunswick, Rutgers University sport venues, "Tour of Somerville/Bound Brook" bike races, nationally recognized public golf courses and more.

- h. Exceptional Nearby Shopping & Lodging:

- j. Active Local Service Organizations: The Elks, Moose, VFW, American Legion, Rotary Club, Garden Club, Friends of the Library, Bound Brook Seniors, Bound Brook Women's Club and many more.

In my role as Mayor, I have the opportunity to speak to outside elected officials, business people and media. I advocate the "Believe in Bound Brook" message.

Finally, after having been the Mayor for this past year, I have:

 Met monthly with the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers and FEMA to expedite the completion and certification of the Green Brook Flood Control Project. It is now clear that flood insurance requirements in Bound Brook will be eliminated in May 2016 when FEMA certifies the new flood zone mapping.

- 2. I have been a Trustee on the Raritan Valley Rail Coalition and worked to advocate full one-seat ride schedules to NYC. Recently, as the Mayor, I published a Proclamation declaring the Borough's support for construction and funding of an additional railroad tunnel between New Jersey and New York City. This will assure full one-seat ride service from Bound Brook to New York City and help increase property values for our town.
- 3. I meet with the Somerset County Business Partnership to enhance the image of Bound Brook.
- 4. I have started a "Greener Cleaner Bound Brook" program, encouraging residents to take pride in our Borough and participate in efforts to keep Bound Brook environmentally clean and sustainable..
- 5. Made every effort to reduce overall Property Taxes in Bound Brook. It is understood that a thorough review of the BOE (51%), County (18%) and Borough (31%) portions of the overall Property Tax is necessary. In every decision the Mayor and Council make, we will consider what the cost is to the Bound Brook taxpayer.

All these policies, programs and efforts will continue if I am re-elected as your Mayor.

Meridia Downtown Apartment Project Planning Board Meeting Thursday, October 29, 2015 at 7:30 PM



The redevelopment proposal for next Meridia project will be presented to the Planning Board on Thursday, October 29, 2015 at 7:30 PM.

The project being proposed is a five story mixed-use building which will consist of ground and mezzanine level parking and 2,350 square feet of ground floor retail space. The applicant is proposing four residential stories above the ground/mezzanine level parking and retail area. The four residential stories will consist of 80 one-bedroom apartments, 92 two bedroom apartments. Site improvements consist of curb, sidewalk, drainage, utilities and landscaping. The existing 1.18-acre property (Block 1Lots 42 & 43) currently contains three commercial buildings and is located in a Redevelopment Zone with frontage along West Main Street.

The first Engineering Review provided the following concerns:

- 1. Pedestrian Access
- 2. Parking
- a. RSIS Standards require 328 parking spaces
- b. Redevelopment Standards require 178 parking spaces
- c. The developer proposes 190 parking
- d. 30 off-site parking spaces are being

proposed

- e. The parking space sizes and configuration (stacked) are of concern
- f. Visitor parking must be addressed
- 3. Courtyard location
- 4. Traffic Impact
- 5. Landscaping and Street Trees
- 6. Sanitary sewer impact

Mayor's Response DEMOCRAT "TALK OF THE TOWN"



In a political effort, prior to the election, the Bound Brook Democrat Party published its quarterly newsletter, "Talk of the Town." The content in the newsletter is dishonest and slanderous. Not believing in the old saying, "see no evil, hear no evil, speak no evil, the newsletter provides a very indignant fabrication of the truth.

First, it must be noted that "Talk of the Town" is not a publication of the Borough of Bound Brook. The use of the Borough Logo on the front page is illegal and falsely leads readers to believe that it is a Borough publication. It is not.

In response to Bound Brook Democrat "Talk of the Town", the following facts are offered for each of the headlines:

1. BOROUGH BUDGET ADOPTED

- a. Mayor Fazen vetoed an Ordinance extending the annual redeveloper tax breaks from 10 years to 30 years. In exchange, the developer would provide the Borough with an \$800,000 "Pay Day Loan" to balance the 2015 budget. Mayor Fazen showed that the proposed Ordinance will cost Borough taxpayers \$30 million over a 30-year period. After hearing overwhelming resident objections, the Democrat Council ignored public comments and shamefully approved the Ordinance.
- The Democrat Council blamed the citizens of Bound Brook for the 2015 property tax increase because they called "Trenton" asking them to reject the proposed "Pay Day Loan" budget. Blaming the people of Bound Brook for the tax increase is not a good idea.
- c. The Democrat Council declared that its 5-year budget projection keeps property taxes "stable" for 5 years while their projection assumes annual property tax increases. The only thing stable about their 5-year projection is the stable increase in property taxes.

2. MAYOR PROVIDES BOROUGH WITH PROPOSAL TO REPAIR TRANSIT STEPS

- a. Mayor Fazen received a step-repair proposal from a contractor. He passed it on to the Borough CFO. He did not advocate the proposal, he merely passed it to the proper authority.
- 3. MAYOR ASKS TAX ASSESSOR TO AUDIT **BROOK THEATER**
- a. The Mayor did not ask the Tax Assessor to audit the Brook Theatre.

b. The Mayor simply asked the Assessor if the Brook Theatre was paying taxes on profit from the Cell Towers and Contractor Storage activities, since this income is not related to their not-for-profit mission.

4. MAYOR IS CENSURED BY BOROUGH COUN-

- a. The Democrat Council played partisan politics in censuring the Mayor's effort to allow Bound Brook teachers to use the vacant spaces in the municipal parking lot.
- b. The Mayor has distributed the following letter to set the facts straight:

PARKING PASSES FOR TEACHERS

There is a misunderstanding about my role in issuing parking passes to the Board of Education ("BOE") so that teachers at the new school could park in the vacant municipal parking lot.

I asked the Parking Commission to consider recommending that the teachers be permitted to use the municipal parking lot rather than parking on the street or in the playground behind the school. It is my understanding that the Parking Commission was in agreement that if the Council voted to allow the teachers to park in the municipal lot, signs should be posted on the street indicating that parking would be restricted for residents only. That will enable students to be able to safely use the school playground, as that is the only other location available for teacher parking, if they are not permitted to park on the street, upsetting residents, or in the municipal lot.

I could see no reason for the Council to not agree with the Superintendent's request. The temporary use of the lot by the teachers will cost the borough nothing, because they are unsold vacant parking spaces.

On the day prior to school starting, the Superintendent of Schools came to Borough Hall and asked the Chief of Police for parking passes that would identify the teacher's vehicles in the municipal lot .The Superintendent had appealed to the Planning Board and the Parking Commission two months prior to school opening, and nothing was done in time for school opening. The Chief checked with me and it was decided that the monthly passes would be provided to identify the vehicles. The BOE was asked to write "BBSD" (for "Bound Brook School District") on the passes to identify their vehicles. The Superintendent was also instructed to provide a list of teachers and vehicles that would be parking in the municipal lot. The number of teachers that

would be parking was 26 and the Superintendent was provided with 30 passes ("for the parking of temporary use of the lot for substitute teachers or administrators"). Again, these passes cost us nothing.

At the first Council meeting after the start of school, the Council voted against allowing the teachers to use the municipal lot and the parking passes were returned to the Borough. I was surprised and disappointed at this. In a small town, we need to work with the BOE,

not against them.

He indicated that he plans to improve this town from his seat on the council in the same way he turned around organizations in the past. He noted that he improved attendance by getting better speakers for Central Jersey Mensa when he was Program Chair for more than a year. He built RVCC ("Raritan Valley Community College") ONE from a two student organization into the third most active club in the country and earned a trip to Washington DC to work with other club leaders from across the nation.

He stated that, in the next few years, he will use all of his resources, experiences and youthful enthusiasm to improve this town. He has undertaken financial condition analysis of cities, and is excited to employ his education and energy to work for the betterment of Bound Brook. He wants to promote fiscal sustainability unlike what is being done the current democrat-controlled under council.

Councilman Anthony Pranzatelli - Councilman Pranzatelli summarized his role in the Redevelopment of downtown Bound Brook and creation of the SID ("Special Improvement District") downtown. He noted that he is the Chairman of the SID and Chairman of the Borough's Finance Committee.

Mayor Bob Fazen - I am Bob Fazen, Mayor of Bound Brook. I spoke to you one year ago and made the following campaign promises: better communications, smarter redevelopment and advocacy of the believe in bound brook motto.

With respect to communications, residents of Bound Brook now receive information about their government and are able to talk to someone about their problems and concerns. After assuming the office of Mayor".

- I started monthly publication of the Bound Brook Chronicle, which now includes a Spanish translation insert. The Democrat Council refused to help me with this publi-
- Town Hall Meetings take place on the first Monday every month. Even members of the Democrat Council come to these meetings to hear what is going on in the

Borough.

- I have an Open Door policy at Borough Hall and receive daily visits from concerned residents. Some visit just to chat about the future of Bound Brook.
- I have published my cellphone number and receive daily calls from residents about their observations and things happening in Bound Brook.

These open lines of communication were not available to the residents of Bound Brook prior to me assuming office.

In my opinion, the taxpayers of Bound Brook will be hurt by the current redevelopment agreements. Ongoing redevelopment projects receive over \$1 million annually in tax breaks and contractually, those tax breaks increase over the next 30 years. The Borough could use the extra \$1 million annually for reducing property taxes and improving Borough services instead of lining the pockets of developers. Future redevelopment must be negotiated for the overall betterment of Bound Brook residents. We cannot allow developers to build apartment buildings with insufficient parking. We cannot permit development without including better retail store infrastructure, cultural amenities, architectural compatibility and historic preservation.

At meetings and events, I speak to other Mayors and Business people from around the state. There is a sense that Bound Brook has a great location, is affordable and provides a family-oriented lifestyle. Locally, I meet with Raritan Valley Rail Coalition to implement a full one-seat ride schedule to NYC, I meet with the Green Brook Flood Control Commission to expedite completion of that Project, I meet with the Somerset County Business Partnership to enhance the image of Bound Brook, I encourage residents to take pride in our Borough and participate in efforts to create a Greener Cleaner Bound Brook.

David Rosario - David summarized his education and his time in Bound Brook and his support of the SID. There were numerous questions from the audience asking about redevelopment, taxes, code enforcement.

The most notable quote of the evening was made by Councilman Pranzatelli when asked why the redevelopment agreement provided such a large tax break to the developer, the Councilman stated, "Maybe we could have negotiated a better deal for the Borough."



La propuesta de reurbanización para el próximo proyecto de Meridia se presentará a la Junta de Planificación el Jueves, 29 de octubre 2015 a las 7:30 PM.

El proyecto que se propone es un edificio de cinco pisos de uso mixto que constará de estacionamientos y de 2.350 pies cuadrados de espacio comercial en la planta baja. El solicitante propone cuatro pisos residenciales por encima del nivel del suelo de estacionamiento y zona comercial. Los cuatro pisos residenciales constarán de 80 apartamentos de un dormitorio, 92 de dos dormitorios. Mejoras de los alrededores consisten en bordillos, aceras, drenaje, servicios públicos y jardin. Respuesta Del Alcalde

A Los Democratas "Talk Of The Town"



En un esfuerzo político, antes de la elección, el Partido Demócrata Bound Brook publicó su boletín trimestral, "Talk of the Town". El contenido en el boletín, que tuvo como objetivo principalmente al alcalde, es deshonesto y calumnioso. Sin creer en el viejo refrán, "no vean mal, no escuchen el mal, no hablen mal", el boletín ofrece una fabricación muy indignada de la verdad.

- a. El alcalde no pidió al asesor de impuestos para auditar el Teatro Brook.
- b. El alcalde se limitó a preguntar al Asesor si el Teatro Brook estaba pagando los impuestos sobre las ganancias de las antenas de telefonía móvil y las actividades de almacenamiento del contratista, ya que estos ingresos no se relacionan con la misión sin fines de lucro del teatro.

4. EL ALCALDE ES SENSURADO POR EL CONCEJO MUNICIPAL

a. Tony y el Consejo Demócrata jugaron la política partidista en censurar a los esfuerzos

- del alcalde para permitir que los profesores de Bound Brook podrian utilizar los espacios vacantes en el estacionamiento municipal.
- El alcalde ha distribuido la siguiente carta sobre este tema para establecer las cosas claras:

PASES DE ESTACIONAMIENTO PARA MAESTROS

Hay un malentendido acerca de mi papel en la emisión de pases de estacionamiento a la Junta de Educación ("BOE" siglas en Ingles) para que los maestros de la nueva escuela puedan estacionarse en el aparcamiento vacante del municipio.

Le pregunté a la Comisión de Aparcamiento para considerar la recomendación de que se permita a los profesores a utilizar el parqueadero municipal en lugar de estacionarse en la calle o en el patio detrás de la escuela. Tengo entendido que la Comisión de aparcamiento estaba de acuerdo en que si el Consejo votó para permitir a los maestros estacionar en el aparcamiento municipal, unas señales deben ser publicados en la calle lo que indica que el estacionamiento se limitaría únicamente para los residentes. Eso permitirá a los estudiantes poder utilizar de forma segura el patio de la escuela, ya que es el otro único lugar disponible para el estacionamiento de los maestros, si no se les permite aparcar en la calle, molestando a los vecinos, o en el aparcamiento municipal.

No pude ver ninguna razón para que el Consejo no estuviera de acuerdo con la solicitud del Superintendente. El uso temporal del lote por los profesores le costará nada al municipio, porque estás plazas vacantes están sin vender. El día antes del comienzo de la escuela, el Superintendente de Escuelas llegó a la alcaldia y le pidió al jefe de la policía pases de estacionamiento que identificaría a los vehículos de los maestros en el aparcamiento municipal . El Superintendente había hecho un llamamiento a la Junta de Planificación y la Comisión de Aparcamiento dos meses antes de la apertura de la escuela, y nada se hizo a tiempo antes del comienzo de la escuela. El Jefe comprobó conmigo y se decidió que se proporcionarían los pases mensuales para identificar los vehículos. El BOE le pidió que escribiera "BBSD" (para "Bound Brook School District") en los pases para identificar sus vehículos. El Superintendente también se encargó de proporcionar una lista de profesores y vehículos que serían estacionados en el aparcamiento municipal. El número de profesores que estarian estacionando eran 26 y al Superintendente le fueron dado 30 pases ("para el estacionamiento de uso temporal de los profesores o administradores suplentes"). Una vez más, estos pases nos cuestan nada. En la primera reunión del Consejo después

del comienzo de la escuela, el Consejo despues del comienzo de la escuela, el Consejo votó en contra de permitir a los profesores a utilizar los pases y fueron devueltos el aparcamiento municipal . Quede sorprendidó y decepcionado con esto. En un pueblo pequeño, tenemos que trabajar con la junta de educación (BOE), no contra ellos.

Desayuno Después de la Campana.. El año pasado hicimos varios cambios en los programas que han sido muy exitosos. Primero fue el programas de "Desayuno después de la camana". 

The Superintendent of Schools, Dan Daniel district, along with the Bound Brook Police Gallagher, Ed.D. highlighted a number of programs that have taken place last year and

Breakfast After the Bell. Last year we made several program changes that have been very successful. First was the Breakfast After the Bell program. Bound Brook captured the first place prize in the NJ Food for Thought School Breakfast Challenge for significantly increasing the number of students eating a healthy morning meal at school.

As the Northern/Central Jersey winning district, Bound Brook received a \$5,000 grant to purchase equipment to sustain breakfast service. In addition, the 5th grade students at Lafayette were treated to a pep rally with an NFL player Mark Herzlich of the New York Giants. Bound Brook's student participation in the federal School Breakfast Program climbed from just 211 students in September 2013 to 1,402 in May 2014 – a 564 percent increase. According to data from the Departments of Education and Agriculture, Bound Brook is now feeding 82 percent of eligible, low-income children.

HEADS UP Program. On Wednesday, October 15th, the HEADS UP Program, sponsored by the Philadelphia Police Department, presented to the students of Bound Brook High School. HEADS UP stands for Heroin Education and Dangerous Substance Understanding Program. The program was a huge success and the district is looking into additional educational programs through the county and state agencies.

Make a Difference Day. In conjunction with the Bound Brook Police Department (BBPD), several of our schools, teams and clubs participated in the Bound Brook Community's' "Make a Difference Day", which is the largest single-day of volunteering in the country. On Saturday, October 25, 2014 the students and staff of the district helped to complete several beautification projects downtown. The that for each of you.

Department have also purchased flags and art wrap covers for light posts and signal boxes to help encourage community and school spirit.

Curriculum. The district has embarked on updating curricular programs and support systems to help our student achieve success. The district has adopted all new curriculum and programs for grades kindergarten through grade 6. We have Journeys languages arts program, Go Math program, and Science Fusion. These three programs are integrated programs that build skills for each curricular discipline in all three programs. At the middle school level, grades 7 and 8 have revamped their math programs to include pre-algebra and algebra 1 courses. While all language arts programs have been rewritten to align with Common Core Curriculum Standards. In addition, the district has realigned the Intervention and Referral Services (I&RS) process to better assist students in their academic endeavors. The district has also trained all of our teacher's grades kindergarten through 6 in responsive classroom techniques.

Retention Policy. The Board of Education has updated the district retention policy. The Board of Education supports educational programs of high academic standards. These programs shall provide maximum opportunity and challenge for each student to progress according to his/her own needs and abilities. Students shall be placed at the grade level most appropriate to their academic, social, and emotional development. Bound Brook School of Choice Program

In April 2011, fifty-six new districts were designated to take part in the Interdistrict Public School Choice program, increasing and improving educational opportunities for children and families. That brought the total number of school districts participating in the program to 71.

Raptor Visitor Management System

The Bound Brook School District is pleased to announce that it began using the Raptor Visitor Management System in all of our district schools to build on the district's program of safety and security for students and faculty. Part of keeping Students and faculty safe is knowing who is in our building at all times and the Raptor system allows us to do that. The Raptor system will better allow us to track visit or ask contractors and volunteers in our schools and provide us with a safer environment for our students and staff.

Upon entering a district building, visitors will be asked to present a valid state issued J D, which will be scanned into the system. The Raptor system will check to ensure that registered sexual offenders are not entering our buildings. It is important to note that the Raptor system only scans the visitor's name, date of birth and photo for comparison with a national database of registered sex offenders. Additional visitor data from the driver's license is not gathered nor is the system connected to any other system such as the Department of Motor Vehicles. Therefore any other information on the ID is not scanned by the systc1n and is not accessible to any of the users. Once entry is approved, Raptor will issue a badge that identifies the visitor, the date, and the purpose of his/her visit.

A visitor's badge will not be necessary for those who visit our schools simply to drop off an item in the office or pick up paperwork. In the event that a person does not have identification, he/she can still be given access to the building, but will be escorted by a school suiff1nember.

The safety of our students is our highest priority and the Raptor visitor management system provides a consistent way to aid in keeping away people who may present a danger to our students, therefore, all visitors to the school must be scanned into the system and obtain a visitor badge. 

Sbound Brook Celebrates 10 Years as a Tree City USA Community

Bound Brook - Mayor Robert Fazen, Councilman Peter Lazzaro and Bound Brook Shade Tree Commissioners recently marked the tenth anniversary of Bound Brook as a Tree City USA Community. The Tree City USA designation is awarded by the Arbor Day Foundation in cooperation with the Unites States Forest Service to municipalities that have made tree planting and nurturing a priority. Approximately six hundred trees have been planted in Bound Brook in the last seven years.

Tree City USA is a nationwide movement that provides the framework necessary for communities to manage and expand their public trees. More than 3,400 communities have made the commitment to becoming a Tree City USA. They have achieved Tree City USA status by meeting four core standards of sound urban forestry management: maintaining a tree board or department, having a community tree ordinance, spending at least \$2 per capita on urban forestry and celebrating Arbor Day.

Bound Brook has a tree management plan

whose primary purpose is to improve the quantity and quality of the shade trees in the community forest. The Shade Tree Commissioners, community volunteers appointed by the mayor, are responsible for executing the plan. This involves inspecting borough trees to determine if tree pruning or removal is needed, planting new trees in public spaces to replace trees that have been removed and adding trees to areas in which they are needed.

The Shade Tree Commission requests the help of borough residents in watering newly planted trees. The first two summers after planting are critical for the survival of the tree. Young trees need to be watered weekly during hot dry summers.

Trees provide many benefits to Bound Brook. They enhance the quality of our life and improve the value of our property. They filter the air we breathe, reduce energy use, and provide a habitat for wildlife. They improve the curb appeal of the neighborhood and help people feel serene, peaceful, and Somerset Patriots manager Brett Jodie said.

Somerset Patriots 2015 Atlantic League Champions



Bridgewater, NJ – The Somerset Patriots clinched the 2015 Atlantic League Championship by defeating the Southern Maryland Blue Crabs 3-1 in the best-of-five series.

The Patriots defeated the Blue Crabs 3-1 in Game Four behind another dominant performance by Playoff MVP Roy Merritt (3-0), who allowed an unearned run with six strikeouts in seven innings of work.

"He didn't have his best stuff, but he did what he had to do to get tough outs. He pounded the zone and his performance speaks for itself," said catcher Adam Donachie, who won his first professional championship in his fourth season in Somerset.

Somerset took a 1-0 lead on a solo home run by designated hitter Thomas Neal (1).

"I was just looking to stay in the middle of the field and continue to swing the bat the best I can. He threw a slider and I stayed on it and was fortunate enough to hit-put a good swing on it-and hit it out," Neal said.

The Blue Crabs answered in the bottom of the second after an error by Robert Andino extended the inning and allowed Jamar Walton to score on an RBI single by Fred Lewis that evened up the score at 1-1.

The Patriots broke the tie with two runs in the seventh. With the bases loaded, David Vidal scored on a passed ball and Neal once again played the hero with an RBI single to provide the 3-1 final. Merritt was named the Playoff MVP for his 3-0 record, 0.41 ERA and 12 strikeouts in 22 innings pitched. He pitched in two deciding playoff games and won both, including a complete game in Game Five of the Liberty Division Series. "Roy's our big game guy. He's a guy that we've loved in every situation the last two years, in any critical situation. That's one thing about the post season. You never know who can handle that load. We know he can. We have a history with him and know we want him out on the mound,"

The 2015 Atlantic League Championship

marks the first of Brett Jodie's career as Somerset Patriots manager. He won one as a player with the team in 2003 and two as pitching coach in 2008 and 2009.

The championship is the sixth for the Somerset Patriots, who have previously won in 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008, and 2009.
