Congratulations Chief Michael Jannone

After 32 years of service to the Bound Brook Police Department, Chief Jannone announced his retirement, effective April 1, 2017. He was promoted to Chief of Police in December 2011 and has been responsible for molding the Department into one of the most highly respected forces in the state of New Jersey. His leadership was responsible for establishing a professional and skilled organization and his administrative and fiscal expertise created a cost-effective and effective operation for the Borough.

Among his many accomplishments as Chief of Police, he instituted the K-9 Program in January 2015 and in March 2017, achieved Police Agency Accreditation through the NJ State Association of Chiefs of Police Law Enforcement Accreditation Program.

Chief Jannone was raised by his grand-parents on Church Street in Bound Brook. He graduated from Bridgewater-Raritan High School-East in 1977 and upon graduation worked for a major pharmaceutical company before enlisting in the U.S. Coast Guard in 1978. He served on active duty until November of 1984 and attained the rank of Petty Officer Second Class. He established himself as a heavy weather boat coxswain and specialized in search and rescue and law enforcement.

He was hired by the Borough of Bound Brook Police Department in February 1985 as a police dispatcher and in July 1985 became a patrol officer. He attended the Middlesex County Police Academy and graduated in December 1985. He was assigned to the patrol division until February 1989 when he was promoted to the rank of Detective and assigned as the juvenile officer. He attended Drug Abuse Resistance Education in Virginia and became bound Brook's first D.A.R.E. ("Drug Abuse Resistant Education") Officer. As a Detective he worked both juvenile and adult cases.

In April 1993, he was promoted to the rank of sergeant and assigned a squad in the patrol division. During that time, he furthered his education and completed a certificate program in public administration from Fairleigh Dickerson University in March 1999. He was promoted to Lieutenant in December 1998 and assigned as the Patrol Commander, detective bureau and services division. In 2001, he graduated from the 207th class of the FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia. In 2001, he was awarded the Marine Corps League Medal of Heroism for rescuing a disabled wheel chair bound victim from a second floor of a structure fire.

He is a member of the International Association of chiefs of Police, the NJ State association of Chiefs of Police, the Somerset County Association of Chiefs of Police and the F.B.I. National Academy Associates. The Chief has also been a volunteer fire fighter for 38 years with the Finderne Fire department in Bridgewater, NJ.

Thanks for your service Chief and best wishes for the future.



ally is a lifelong resident of Bound Brook and a certified school nurse at Bound Brook High School. She is a graduate of Muhlenberg Regional Medical Center School of Nursing, Union County College and the College of New Jersey. She completed advanced-degree studies at Caldwell College, where she received

her certification. Early in her career, she helped save many lives through her work in the emergency department and emergency medical services. During the 1970's she was one of the first nurses working in pre-hospital advanced life support – to-day's paramedics. She also was responsible for the education and mentoring of hundreds of paramedic students, many of whom have successful careers in public health, medicine, law enforcement, and emergency medical and fire services.

As a school nurse, her list of accomplishments is monumental. She established the Breakfast-after-the-Bell program for at-risk students in the Bound Brook School District, which today serves nearly 2,000 students.

She worked with area retail stores to provide students with free eye examinations and glasses. Without this program, many students would have never received glasses and would continue struggling to read.

She first brought the "Every 15 Minutes" program to the high school, which is a two-day program focusing on high school juniors and seniors, challenging them to think about drinking, driving, personal safety, and the responsibility of making mature decisions.

Sally is always dedicated to the Bound Brook community, providing nutrition educational sessions to the Hispanic community, "El Poder Sobre La Diabetes."

he Bound Brook Girls Basketball team went into the NJ State Tournament of Champions ranked No. 16 in the NJ.com Top 20, but were unable to sustain for four full quarters in a 62-39 loss to No. 3 Red Bank Catholic at Pine Belt Arena in Toms River.

The first five minutes showed promise and saw Bound Brook grab a 10-6 lead. But Red Bank Catholic reeled off a 10-0 run from there and never relented against a short-handed squad – though the Crusaders weren't willing to use that as an excuse.

The Crusaders were without starting sophomore Cortlyn Morris who is the NJ State leader in blocked shots and handles the point guard position as an outstanding ball handler. Bound Brook head coach Jennifer Derevjanik said. "I felt like, it's tough without Cortlyn, but we've got to play, it's



a part of the game, team's get injuries all the time."

Coupled with playing against a battle-test, experienced and deep Red Bank Catholic squad, it eventually proved too much for Bound Brook to overcome.

But considering the Crusaders' historic week, Derevjanik wasn't willing to give into the disappointment of a tough night; after all, Bound Brook was playing in its first-ever Tournament of Champions just a few days after securing the school's only state title.

Coach Derevjanik noted that a number of her student athletes were being recruited to by other schools, but all chose to stay home and lead Bound Brook to its first state championship. Derevjanik said. "It's an excellent group of players. I wish the season didn't ever end because I love them so much, but that's the way it is."

WRESTLERS OF THE YEAR: Back to back, Stephan Glasgow and Mekhi Lewis of Bound Brook brought the star power to Boardwalk Hall.

To win their second straight state titles, both wrestlers defeated defending state champions in the two premier bouts of the State Wrestling Championships.

Glasgow won the 152-pound title by beating Bergen Catholic's Shane Griffith. Griffith was vying to stay in the hunt to become a four-time state champion, but Glasgow -- a three-time finalist and two-time champion -- got the only takedown in a 3-2 decision.

Lewis, who was named co-Most Outstanding Wrestler, earned the honor by defeating Kyle Cochran of Paramus, 5-3. Combined, the duo went 79-1.

Lewis, a Virginia Tech signee, was undefeated and extended his two-year winning streak to 70 wins in a row while Glasgow, a Rutgers signee, suffered his only loss in the final round of the Powerade Tournament in a bout that was decided in ultimate tiebreaker.

HAIL TO THE CRUSADERS: Forced to forfeit several weight classes, Bound Brook lost to Cedar Grove in the North 2, Group 1 final but got plenty of redemption in Atlantic City.

George Walton added a third state title for the Bound Brook by beating Sam Wustefeld of Scotch Plains-Fanwood in the 182-pound final. Senior Robert Cleary added a third-place finish at 138 while ju-

nior Joe Casey picked up his third state medal by finishing sixth at 145.

In the final game, Evian Brown led four Bound Brook players with double-digits as the senior collected 17 points. A total of 10 of those points came in the first half as Tyson Amaker and Kyle Frauenheim shouldered the second-half scoring load with 12 points apiece. Amaker posted 11 points in the second half while Frauenheim hit three of his game-high four 3-pointers in the final 16 minutes.

Noah Smith also tallied double-digit points with 11 as Amaker grabbed a teamhigh nine rebounds and Brown dished out six assists.
